

FY24 FEMA Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Program

The BRIC program aims to categorically shift the federal focus away from reactive disaster spending and toward research-supported, proactive investment in community resilience. Projects must reduce or eliminate risk from natural hazards though infrastructure projects, policy development, or workforce enhancements.

Federal FEMA deadlines are listed below, but states require earlier deadlines for local agencies and governments that vary by state. Contact us for more information on your state's contact information and deadlines.


FEMA will fund the following uses of assistance through BRIC:

- **Building Code Adoption and Enforcement:** For States or Tribes to facilitate the adoption and enforcement of the latest published editions of building codes.
- Capability and Capacity Building Activities: Enhance the knowledge, skills, and expertise of current workforce to expand or improve administration of mitigation assistance
- Mitigation Projects: Cost-effective projects designed to increase resilience and public safety; reduce injuries and loss of life; and reduce damage and destruction to property, critical services, facilities, and infrastructure
- Management Costs: Eligible and reasonable indirect costs, direct administrative costs, and other
 administrative expenses associated with a specific mitigation project or capability and capacity
 building activity

For the FY24 round, FEMA indicated a decrease in funding to \$750M, compared to \$1B in FY23.

Note: Economically disadvantaged rural communities and projects located within or benefiting Community Disaster Resilience Zones are eligible for an increase in cost share up to 90% Federal / 10% Non-Federal.

ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

As a result of numerous major disaster declarations over the past 7 years, all states and federally recolonized Tribal nations are eligible to apply in FY 2024.

Must have current FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) at time of application and award (except for project scoping activities). Ideally, your proposed project or program is in alignment or identified in your HMP.

Eligible applicants must apply for funding using the FEMA Grants Outcome (FEMA GO) management system. To apply, visit https://go.fema.gov/.
